Welcome to St. Elizabeth Seton’s Family Faith Formation program. We invite all families to join us on a dynamic journey of faith. The Family Faith Formation Staff is committed to supporting and equipping our families in their Domestic Church, where parents share the Catholic faith with their children by their living example.

What Is the Domestic Church?

The term “Domestic Church” refers to the **family**, the smallest body of gathered believers in Christ. The term dates all the way back to the first century AD. Our Early Church Fathers understood that the home was fertile ground for discipleship, sanctification, and holiness. “The Christian home is the place where children receive the first proclamation of the faith. For this reason, the family home is rightly called the “Domestic Church”, a community of grace and prayer, a school of human virtues and of Christian charity.

Pope Francis, during the World Meeting of Families, highlighted the importance of FAMILY:

- ♥ **FAMILY IS THE FOUNDATION OF THE SOCIETY-** the building block of society
- ♥ **THE MOST BEAUTIFUL THING GOD MADE: THE FAMILY.**
- ♥ **GOD SENT HIS SON INTO THE WORLD IN A FAMILY WHICH HAD ITS HEARTS OPEN TO LOVE.**
- ♥ **GOD WANTS FAMILIES WHERE MEMBERS LOVE EACH OTHER AND EDUCATE THEIR CHILDREN IN GOODNESS.**
- ♥ **DIFFICULTIES IN THE FAMILY EXIST BUT THEY ARE OVERCOME WITH LOVE.**
- ♥ **PAY ATTENTION TO CHILDREN AND GRANDPARENTS-** children are the future of the family, grandparents the memory and faith traditions of the family.
- ♥ **HOLINESS AND LOVE ARE MANIFESTED IN THE LITTLE GESTURES OF EACH DAY.**
- ♥ **JESUS ENCOURAGES THESE LITTLE LOVING GESTURES AS SIGNS OF HIS PRESENCE IN THE WORLD.**
- ♥ **THE FAMILY, THE HOME IS WHERE FAITH IS LEARNED AND GROWS**
- ♥ **THE IMPORTANCE OF PARENTS BEING GOOD MODELS OF VIRTUE-** “May our children find in us men and women capable of joining others in bringing to full flower all the good seeds which the Father has sown!”

Our Parents will:


- ✚ Be the first and best teachers of the Catholic faith by their living example.

- ✚ Invite the Holy Spirit to open their mind, heart, eyes, ears and soul to the presence of God within.
- ✚ Welcome Jesus, your best friend, into your heart so you can become the Best-Version-of-Yourself.
- ✚ Treat everyone as Jesus would with compassion, kindness, respect, peace and love.

Family Faith Formation

One of the documents of the Second Vatican Council, *Lumen Gentium* ("Light of the Nations"), **states the Domestic Church has a particular role and responsibility in leading souls to heaven:** "In it parents should, by their word and example, be the first preachers of the faith to their children; they should encourage them in the vocation which is proper to each of them, fostering with special care vocation to a sacred state". Christ is the Light of the Nations, and we, the church, each have a responsibility to bring the Light of Christ to others. *Within the Domestic Church, this means that parents are to cultivate a family life that is centered on Christ.*



Christ chose to be born and grow up in the home of the holy family of Joseph and Mary. The Church is nothing other than "the family of God." From the beginning, the core of the Church was often constituted by those who had become believers "together with all [their] household." When they were converted, they desired that "their whole household" should also be saved. These families who became believers were islands of Christian life in an unbelieving world. (Catechism of Catholic Church, CCC 165)

In our own time, in a world often alien and even hostile to faith, believing families are of primary importance as centers of living, radiant faith. (CCC 156) The home is the first school of Christian life and "a school for human enrichment." Here one learns

endurance and the joy of work, fraternal love, generous - even repeated - forgiveness, and above all divine worship in prayer and the offering of one's life. (CCC 1657)

The United States Council of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) provides some helpful ways that families can live out their vocation as the domestic Church. Suggestions include praying as a family daily, keeping physical reminders of faith (such as a crucifix) in the house, and celebrating the liturgical feasts of the Church. Our Family Faith Formation program is designed to form children in the Catholic faith within their family. The foundation of our formation is our celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, for all faith flows from the Living presence of God.

We come together as a parish family on Sundays to worship God, break open the Living Word of God and receive the Living Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. We encounter Jesus Christ in the Word of God, the Eucharist, the Priest and each other, the community of faith. In times of social distancing, we encounter Christ in our Domestic Church through virtual participation in the Mass, prayer, liturgical, and other online formation opportunities.

All faith flows from the Mass where we encounter Jesus Christ and are filled with grace to be His hands and feet in the world. **“The Christian faith is not a theory, philosophy, or idea, but an encounter with the person of Jesus Christ.” – Pope Francis**

Our Family Faith Formation program will be using the Pflaum Gospel Weeklies curriculum. This wonderful program is unique in several ways:

- ❖ **Your whole family can easily share in learning because your children are studying lessons based on the Gospel proclaimed in church on Sunday.** You can gather all your children at one time to share what they have learned and to talk about the lesson as a family.
- ❖ **The Sunday liturgy is the heart of the parish community and domestic church.** This weekly celebration of love, the Mass, is more meaningful to young people because they are familiar with the Gospel proclaimed each week. They have studied it in class and wrestled with its meaning. Students and their families hear the Gospel of Jesus Christ. They learn the Gospel. They love the Gospel. They live the Gospel in their daily lives. They share the Gospel both in the community of faith and, by their witness and loving service of others, with every person they meet.
- ❖ **Every week your child will receive a new, 4-color lesson dated for each Sunday of the liturgical year.** These lessons are the heart of the program, written fresh each year. They will be used in class and then brought home for you to see and talk about with your children.
- ❖ **Each child also receives a “catechism handbook” called What the Church Believes and Teaches.** This handbook contains all the doctrinal elements

essential at each grade level. This book will be used in class and sent home at the end of the year.

- ❖ **There are several free on-line resources designed for families:** The Gospel at Home, a weekly summary of the Sunday Gospel with suggestions for you to use at home, weekly videos and the GROW blog. All of these can be found at <https://www.pflaumweeklies.com/family/>.

There are several ways our parents will be actively involved in Family Faith Formation. They will:

- **Engage the Gospel lesson at home**, which your child begins in class, using the Pflaum Gospel weekly materials. Praying and discerning the Gospel message as your family prepares to encounter Jesus at Sunday Mass.
- **Celebrate the Sacrifice of the Mass** on Sundays as a family.
- **Attend the last 30 minutes of class, once a month**, to engage in faith formation with your child.
- **Participate in Family Faith Formation Large Events** such as the Living Rosary, Advent and Lent Event, Family Masses.
- **Assist the Catechist 2-3 times a year in the classroom** encountering the beauty of the faith of children and lending your helping hands.
- **Lead your family in serving at the Harvest Sunday Food Drive** (in the fall), the largest service project at St. Elizabeth Seton each year.
- **Experience the life of our parish community** exploring the many ministries and events that are offered to build our family of faith and help those in need.

Sacraments

Sacraments are the way to receive God's eternal grace, they are the means through which the faithful can come closer to God's love and experience His never-ending mercy and blessings throughout their lifetime.

Baptism is a Sacrament of Initiation into the Catholic Church, the beginning of new life in Christ. **All families enrolled in our Family Faith Formation program should be baptized.** Call Family Faith Formation or the Parish Office (630) 416-3325 for more information.

At Baptism, you chose the priceless grace of your child becoming a child of God.

The fruit of Baptism, or baptismal grace, is a rich reality that includes forgiveness of original sin and all personal sins, birth into the new life by which a child becomes an adoptive son or daughter of the Father, a member of Christ and a temple of the Holy Spirit.

Catholic Sacraments are a sign of God's love for us. Through the sacraments God shows us that He is always with us, and that He wants to embrace and fill us with His grace in every moment of life.

Through the sacrament of the Eucharist, God shows His love, by giving His only son Jesus to us. Receiving Jesus through Holy communion and knowing that Jesus is within you, is the most beautiful experience. We become one with Jesus. Jesus' body and blood mingles with ours. Imagine God's Divinity combined with our Humanity. This presence strengthens us to be faithful followers of Jesus. It is food for our journey, the Bread of Life. This a gift we want our children to receive every Sunday, if not every day!

Through the sacrament of penance, Jesus expresses His love for all His children today. He demonstrates His power to heal us, to free us from the bondage of sin, and raise us to new life. In turn, this sacrament allows us to come to know, love and serve Jesus. This beautiful sacrament of forgiveness, our soul becoming white as the new snow, should be received often.

Preparation to receive the Sacraments of First Eucharist and Reconciliation begins at birth and continues throughout a child's life. Most children will receive these sacraments in second grade. Our Family Faith Formation program will provide specific materials to prepare for these tremendous gifts beginning in first grade. For older children, special arrangements will be provided for sacramental formation. In addition to our Pflaum Gospel Weeklies materials, our families journey through the life-changing [Blessed](#) program, from Dynamic Catholic, to prepare for these Sacraments.

Through the Sacrament of Confirmation, the Holy Spirit strengthens the graces received at Baptism, provides more of them, and seals them all inside our soul – like a carefully wrapped present! This brings us closer to Christ and better prepares us to face the daily challenges of Christian life. At Confirmation, we accept God's mission to bring the Good News to all people and we receive courage and the power of the Holy Spirit, as the early disciples did at Pentecost.

Preparation to Confirm our faith in Jesus Christ begins at Baptism. Within the Family Faith Formation program, preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation takes place over a two-year period. Specific materials will be provided families beginning in seventh grade to learn about the many gifts, fruits and power of the Holy Spirit. The Sacrament of Confirmation is conferred at the beginning of freshman year.

R. C. I. A.

The Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults is the process by which older children and adults prepare to receive the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist) through a period of formation and study in the faith.

Older children who are not baptized can receive the Sacrament of Baptism as part of the R.C.I.A. process with other family members who are seeking to enter the Catholic Church. Alternatively, they may receive the Sacrament when they enter into our Family Faith Formation Program, in consultation with the pastoral staff.

Anyone who wishes to enter the Catholic Church, desires to complete their reception of the Sacraments of Initiation, or has questions regarding entry into the Church, should call the Faith Formation office 630-416-1992 for more information.

Policies

Registration

Registration forms for the Family Faith Formation program are available on our parish website <https://www.sesnaperville.org/68> . It is necessary that all families participating in our Family Faith Formation program be registered parishioners at St. Elizabeth Seton <https://www.sesnaperville.org/newcomers> .

Our program meets on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 4:45-6:00 pm for grades kindergarten through sixth grade. Our seventh and eighth graders meet on Tuesdays from 7:00-8:15 pm. All classes meet at St. Elizabeth Seton church.

Registration and requested days for class (grades K-6) are handled on a first come, first serve basis. Please complete and submit your registrations as soon as possible. Full payment of tuition is due on September 1.

Families living in the area need to be a registered parishioner, for one year, before joining our Family Faith Formation program for sacramental preparation to receive Confirmation.

Special Needs

The REACH (Religious Education Apostolate for Christian Handicapped) program meets twice a month on Saturday mornings at St. Raphael parish. One "Helper"

Arrival and Dismissal

We ask that children and parents arrive on time for classes, meetings and large group events. Our time together is limited, and we value every minute! Our Catechists usually arrive a couple minutes before class to set up the room. *Children may not be dropped off more than 10 minutes prior to the start of class.* For your child's safety they will remain in the gathering space of the lower entrance to the building until their Catechist is ready to start class. **We ask that you walk your children into the building and to pick them up from their classroom.** This interaction with the Catechist and other parents increases our community experience.

Christian Behavior

We begin every class with prayer inviting the Holy Spirit to guide all our actions, thoughts and feelings. We call upon the Blessed Mother to lead us to her son Jesus. This prayer gives everyone an opportunity to let go of burdens of the day and opens our ears, minds and hearts to the many gifts God has instore for us. We expect that all Catechists, assistants, parents and children interact with each other with loving kindness and Christian virtue. **We want everyone treated with the compassion, respect, peace and love of Jesus.**

Communication

In addition to our face to face encounters each week, our main method of communication will be via the email and text system, Flocknote. For this reason, all families must provide an email address and cell phone number. Catechists will also communicate directly with their families.

Emergency Class Cancellation

If Naperville School District 203 is closed due to an emergency situation, Family Faith Formation classes will be canceled. All events and meetings at the church will also be canceled. We will notify you via Flocknote text and email of any changes to our schedule.

Health Concerns/Medication

Please inform us of any health or behavior concerns regarding your child. All information is treated as highly confidential. We want to create a loving,

peaceful environment for families and children to encounter Jesus and will do our best to accommodate the needs of all children.

Child Abuse

In Illinois, all people who work with children are considered mandate reporters. We are required by law to report evidence of abuse or neglect of minors to the Illinois Department of Child and Family Services. Catechists and assistants shall be required annually to sign the state form acknowledging that they are aware of their status as mandated reporters.

Safe Environment Education

The Diocese of Joliet requires that "All Catholic schools and parish family faith formation programs in the Diocese of Joliet must offer instruction for children, grades K-12, and their parents, to prevent child sexual abuse." This education effort is the companion to our requirement for all staff and volunteers who work with minors to go through **Protecting God's Children** seminar and have a criminal Background Check. Parishes are only exempt from this requirement if local school districts are offering these programs. *Naperville School Districts 203 and 204 cover safe environment topics in grades K-12 so it is not repeated in our program.*

Protecting God's Children

Protecting God's Children for Adults is a training program conducted by certified facilitators on the prevention of child sexual abuse. The training educates participants on the signs of child sexual abuse, the methods and means by which offenders commit abuse, and how to prevent it. This training is required within the Diocese of Joliet for all adults who work with or volunteer in serving children. **All parents are encouraged to attend this training.** To register please visit https://www.virtusonline.org/virtus/protecting_children.cfm
